



## OBJECTS OF KIWANIS

THE SIX PERMANENT OBJECTS OF KIWANIS INTERNATIONAL WERE APPROVED BY KIWANIS CLUB DELEGATES AT THE 1924 CONVENTION IN DENVER, COLORADO. THROUGH THE SUCCEEDING DECADES, THEY HAVE REMAINED UNCHANGED:

- To give primacy to the human and spiritual rather than to the material values of life.
- To encourage the daily living of the Golden Rule in all human relationships.
- To promote the adoption and the application of higher social, business, and professional standards.
- To develop, by precept and example, a more intelligent, aggressive, and serviceable citizenship.
- To provide, through Kiwanis clubs, a practical means to form enduring friendships, to render altruistic service, and to build better communities.
- To cooperate in creating and maintaining that sound public opinion and high idealism which make possible the increase of righteousness, justice, patriotism, and goodwill.



## CLUB HISTORY

- The Capital City Kiwanis Club was chartered on October 19, 1959 by the Tallahassee Kiwanis Club, with 58 charter members.
- On January 14, 1964, the club sponsored the sixth club outside North America in Reykavik-Hekla, Iceland. This club chartered with 52 members, and was the first of more than 45 clubs with 1,300 members now in the Iceland District.
- The club strives to make Tallahassee a better place to live and work by providing services which are beyond the scope of government, best exemplified by the many projects and initiatives that the club has undertaken since its inception.
- In addition to fulfilling the Kiwanis Motto **“Serving the Children of the World”** through the club’s special emphasis on youth, adults and other community services are not overlooked. Capital City’s efforts to improve the quality of life reach all sectors of the community.
- Athletics is also special to the club. Through sponsorship of numerous major sporting events with youth, collegiate, special needs, and church participants, Capital City demonstrates its dedication in a city where sports are a major attraction.
- The club is a leader in the Florida Kiwanis District, with several members elected to Lt. Governor and other state-wide leadership capacities, as well the bulletin and inter-club work of Capital City winning numerous state awards. The club is also a pioneer in gender and racial membership diversity in Tallahassee.
- More than 260,000 individuals in 96 countries around the world proudly wear the “K” of Kiwanis because they have the desire to become personally involved in their communities. As a group, they achieve what individuals cannot do alone. This is one of the prime objectives of the Capital City Kiwanis Club.
